Communities everywhere are experiencing significant and unpredictable shifts in the social and physical infrastructure of their landscapes. In the midst of a cultural, political, and ecological moment which has no precedent, it seems as though many of our contemporary crises have one thing in common: they will either be alleviated or drastically exacerbated by the alliance of professions working to improve the built environment. Now more than ever, the world is in need of designers, planners, and policy-makers who are willing to use this moment of great change as momentum to imagine a new era of community development, one which prioritizes creative and systemic solutions. One sector that continues to be in great need of systemic solutions is housing. As rental rates soar and class-based equity gaps widen, many people are losing what few housing options they had. For many, the dream of homeownership has been replaced by a struggle to afford monthly rent as a tenant. This Master's Project seeks to expand upon the work of Pioneer Valley Habitat for Humanity (PVHH) as they gain traction in a robust community initiative to build smaller, sustainable and affordable homes for low-income families in Western Massachusetts. The work that follows was developed in response to PVHH's efforts and their recent acquisition of 1 Garfield Avenue, a residential parcel in the village of Florence,

Massachusetts. This research and design work aims to contextualize this region's housing affordability crisis within the broader scale of a national, historical timeline of housing inequity for the poor. It will identify opportunities for meaningful, affordable and sustainable landscape design solutions that can enhance the experience of first-time homeownership for low-income families. It will offer resources and information to these families so that they might be more equipped to identify their property's opportunities and constraints, and be more informed as they implement landscape design projects in the future. This project will culminate with a conceptual Master Plan for the parcel and some recommendations moving forward.

Author Jonathan Bell, an experienced architecture journalist, divides the book into four chapters that correspond to the main trends he discerns in the featured buildings: "The House in the Landscape" presents houses that stand alone in the landscape as architectural statements in the grand Modernist tradition; "New Urban Sites" highlights homes that fit into a larger architectural fabric; "Pragmatic Solutions" focuses on designs for livable, affordable, and environmentally sustainable housing; and "The Future" surveys architects' varying visions of tomorrow's house. The case studies of individual houses within these chapters include not only the architects' own plans and elevations but also a generous number of full-color interior and exterior photographs--some 300 in all. Useful supplementary features, including an introduction that illuminates the present state of residential architecture and project credits that include contact information for the featured architects, ensure that this handily-sized volume will be welcomed by all practitioners, students, and enthusiasts of architecture.

HOW TO HOUSE THE HOMELESS

Russell Sage Foundation How to House the Homeless, editors Ingrid Gould Ellen and Brendan O'Flaherty propose that

the answers entail rethinking how housing markets operate and developing more efficient interventions in existing service programs. The book critically reassesses where we are now, analyzes the most promising policies and programs going forward, and offers a new agenda for future research. *How to House the Homeless* makes clear the inextricable link between homelessness and housing policy. Contributor Jill Khadduri reviews the current residential services system and housing subsidy programs. For the chronically homeless, she argues, a combination of assisted housing approaches can reach the greatest number of people and, specifically, an expanded Housing Choice Voucher system structured by location, income, and housing type can more efficiently reach people at-risk of becoming homeless and reduce time spent homeless. Robert Rosenheck examines the options available to homeless people with mental health problems and reviews the cost-effectiveness of five service models: system integration, supported housing, clinical case management, benefits outreach, and supported employment. He finds that only programs that subsidize housing make a noticeable dent in homelessness, and that no one program shows significant benefits in multiple domains of life. Contributor Sam Tsemberis assesses the development and cost-effectiveness of the Housing First program, which serves mentally ill homeless people in more than four hundred cities. He asserts that the program's high housing retention rate and general effectiveness make it a viable candidate for replication across the country. Steven Raphael makes the case for a strong link between homelessness and local housing market regulations—which affect housing affordability—and shows that the problem is more prevalent in markets with stricter zoning laws. Finally, Brendan O'Flaherty bridges the theoretical gap between the worlds of public health and housing research, evaluating the pros and cons of subsidized housing programs and the economics at work in the rental housing market and home ownership. Ultimately, he suggests, the most viable strategies will serve as safety nets—"social insurance"—to reach people who are homeless now and to prevent homelessness in the future. It is crucial that the links between effective policy and the whole cycle of homelessness—life conditions, service systems, and housing markets—be made clear now. With a keen eye on the big picture of housing policy, *How to House the Homeless* shows what works and what doesn't in reducing the numbers of homeless and reaching those most at risk.

EAST AUSTIN'S TIPPING POINT

AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE SALTILLO DISTRICT REDEVELOPMENT

The City of Austin and Capital Metro's decisions in the coming months about the Saltillo District Redevelopment will shape the future of East Austin. The Saltillo District will be home to a mixed-use development, including residential and commercial space and a commuter rail stop. Many long-time residents of the neighborhood around the Saltillo District, historically low income and Latino, are at risk of being displaced from their homes by rising rents and property tax burdens. Displacement pressures are likely to amplify in the future because of surging demand for housing close to downtown and a lack of affordable private development. The Saltillo redevelopment could provide more than 600 units of affordable housing, set the tone for future developments in the neighborhood and solidify the city's commitment to preventing displacement. In April, the project's Community Advisory Group unanimously rejected the proposed master plan for the development. The group believes the plan's affordable housing targets are insufficient. The CAG also takes umbrage with plans for the commercial space in the development and its financing. The city and Capital Metro have pledged to take these concerns seriously, but the city faces a dilemma. Its financial self-interest is best served by building as large of a tax base as possible, but keeping property values and tax rates down are the key to preventing displacement and gentrification. A compromise - an 11- story building in exchange for guaranteed affordable housing and small business protection - is a possibility. So is a continuation of the city's historical legacy of fracturing communities of color and pushing them further and further east.

THE POOR SIDE OF TOWN

Each entry discusses the historical origins of the problem or debate; past means used to deal with the issue; the current controversy surrounding the issue from all perspectives; and the near-term and future implications for society. In addition, each entry includes a chronology, a bibliography, and a directory of Internet resources for further research as well as primary documents and statistical

tables highlighting the debates.
