I certainly did not then feel the fear and trepidation that I do now, as I stand on the threshold of the second volume being published, this one on the East Indian languages. I have had a lifelong acquaintance with the South Indian languages of Malayalam, Telugu, Kannada and Tamil, through the several trips made to the neighbouring states during school holidays to visit numerous relatives. Hence, I did not feel any discomfort during my trips to Hyderabad,

Trivandrum or Bangalore to meet with the various writers I needed to meet for the first volume. On the other hand, the trips that I undertook for my research on the eastern languages left me utterly bewildered most of the time. Apart from the usual problems like an unknown language, an unknown region and unfamiliar food habits, I was faced with many a practical difficulty on account of the work itself. There was the problem of communicating with some writers who could not understand English. Then there was the problem of transcribing the cassettes of the interviews several times on account of the different pronunciations. Worse still were the additional trips I had to undertake to far off places like Darjeeling and Imphal when I found that the interviews had not yielded sufficient material or there were doubts that had to be personally clarified with the writers. The project was basically accomplished in three phases. The initial spadework involving research on the language, the field work that involved travelling to the homes of the various writers and interviewing them and then the work of transcribing the tapes on my return to Chennai and editing and writing them up. I took the assistance of others only to transcribe the tapes. While my assistants found the job of transcribing the tapes containing the interviews of the South Indian writers easy on account of their familiarity with the languages, they were somewhat challenged when it came to the Eastern language interviews. As a result of lack of proper communication, the interviews of some important writers have unfortunately been excluded from this volume. Despite sending him two letters, I could not get in touch with the Jnanpith Award-winning Oriya poet Sitakant Mohapatra. I probably had the wrong address and, as a result, the letters possibly never reached him. In the years that have gone by between my fieldwork in the eastern region and the release of this volume, there have been many changes, many losses. Dr. Birendra Bhattacharya and Dr. Jagat Chhetri, who accorded me such a warm welcome and hospitality in Guwahati and Darjeeling respectively, are no longer with us. Mr. Subhas Mukhopadhyay, who was so encouraging, is today able to communicate with others only with the help of a writing board. Although I grieve these losses, I am happy that I was able to interact with these people when they were at their cheerful best. All the trials and tribulations that I had to face in the course of this work are of no matter to me now that the book has been published, after systematic and honest research and through the co-operation of all the esteemed writers. The foreword written by the Jnanpith Award-winning Malayalam writer M.T. Vasudevan Nair is an ornament that serves to embellish this volume. I am thankful to him and all the others who have made this work possible. My inner soul calls to me at his juncture, cheering me at this halfway mark and encouraging me to proceed undaunted with my efforts to complete this Herculean task. **Part. II** The work was undertaken in the belief that the records of a district situated as Nellore is would contain a lot of new matters of historical importance. This hope has not been realized. The great bulk of the inscriptions consists of grants to tanks and temples which are of no interest whatever and perhaps only one inscription (No. 26 of Kandukúr) can be pointed to as having a real historical motive. The collection supplies a few new historical names, mostly of only local importance, and fixes a few doubtful dates but of the condition of the country and the people in past ages, it tells us nothing. In short, the principal fruit of our labours is that we have saved epigraphists from wasting time on the exploration of a barren area. The information supplied by the inscriptions being so scanty, the history of the district as revealed by them can be compressed into a few lines. To begin with, it will be noted that records, anterior to the twelfth century are rare. The wonder is, indeed, that so many have survived, having in view the indifference of the people to ancient remains. Nor are officials free from blame in this matter as is testified to by the old buildings of the Collector's cutcherry at Nellore in the construction of which inscribed stones have been freely employed. The centuries subsequent to the eleventh are fairly prolific in remains, the thirteenth century being especially well represented. The epigraphical history of the Nellore district begins with Copper-plate No. 24. This is a grant by the Western Chalukyan King Vikramáitya I in the seventh century. It records the gift of a village which has not been identified. Assuming that the grant relates to the Nellore district, we find in it an indication of the dispossession of the Pallavas from this part of the East Coast by the Western Chalukyan dynasty. It is probable that the next glimpse of the past is obtained through No. 54 of Gúdúr which gives a Pallava king reigning over part of the district insubordination, apparently, to the Western Chalukyas. This inscription may be assigned with probability to the eighth century. After this, we seem to hear no more of the Western Chalukyas or of the mainline of the Pallavas and for a long period, we lose sight altogether of the southern part of the district. In the north, however, we have clear indications in the ninth and tenth centuries to show that it then formed a part of the Eastern Chalukyan dominions and towards the close of the latter century the Bána dynasty appears on the scene as is proved by a single inscription from Podili. From the middle of the twelfth century the Kakatiyas became the dominant power, and Warangal emerged as the premier cultural and political center. The Kakatiyas consolidated their power by defeating defiant feudatories and bestowing administrative power on loyal subordinates, and by entering into matrimonial alliances with families of conquered local chieftans. Under their rule different social groups migrated to the coastal Andhra region from the neighbouring Tamil country, resulting in the creation of new sub-sects. Further, social groups came to be named on the basis of local identity, such as the Pakanati and Velanati brahmins, the Penugonda vaisyas, and the Panta and Pakanati redds, to mention a few. Based on a centralized bureaucracy, the Kakatiya state could be broadly characterized as feudal. The mainstay of the economy was agriculture and there was a substantial increase in irrigation facilities. Trade flourished under a system of guilds and led to the growth of a number of urban centers. The institution of the temple gained significance, facilitated by royal patronage. Buddhism witnessed a decline even as Sri Vaishnavism and Vira Saivism gained ground, and Andhradesa came to be known as Trilinga - the land of the three Saivite shrines at Kalesvaram, Srisailam, and Draksharama. In architecture the vesara mode flourished under the Kakatiyas, while the phamsana form was popular in the construction of monuments in the Telangana region.
